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- 1 Q. Can you please introduce yourself to the 2 jury?
 - A. Senior police officer Xavier Avila.
 - Q. And where are you currently employed?
 - A. Houston Police Department.
 - Q. And which division?
 - A. Homicide division.
 - Q. How long have you been with H.P.D.?
- 9 A. Approximately 32 years.
- 10 Q. Thirty-two years. Wow. And how long have
- 11 you been working in the homicide division?
- A. I've been assigned to homicide or Squad 1
 30 years.
- 14 Q. I'm sorry?

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- 15 A. 30 years in homicide.
- 16 Q. Wow. Okay. And during your tenure in
 17 homicide, have you worked few or many cases involving
 18 the death of an infant?
- 19 A. Many.
- Q. I want to turn your attention to April the
 1st of 2010. Did you receive a followup assignment
 from the evening before's shift?
- 23 A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Okay. And did that involve a case with an infant?

A. Yes, ma'am.

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- Q. Okay. And what was the infant's name?
- 3 A. Kamron Kelly.
- 4 Q. And how is it that you receive assignments?
- 5 | Is it random, or who makes that decision?
 - A. My lieutenant.
 - Q. Okay. And did you have a partner at that time?
- 9 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 10 Q. Who was that?
- 11 A. Sergeant J. Delacruz.
- 12 Q. And when you first received the assignment,
- did you review anything that had been done the
- 14 | evening before by the other officers?
- 15 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 16 Q. Okay. And what did you review?
- 17 A. I reviewed the supplements that were
- 18 | available at the time from the previous investigator.
- 19 Q. All right. So, what was the first thing
- 20 | that you did on this investigation?
- 21 A. We drove to Texas Children's Hospital to
- 22 | check on Kamron and interview the biological mother.
- 23 Q. Okay. And she had been interviewed -- is
- 24 | that correct -- the evening before as well?
- 25 A. Yes, ma'am.

- Q. Okay. Did you have a chance -- you said you went to Texas Children's Hospital?
 - A. Yes, ma'am.

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- Q. Okay. Did you ever go to the scene of the crime, the apartment?
 - A. Yes, I did.
- Q. And for what purpose did you go over to the apartment?
- A. Looking to see if we could find Nathaniel Flowers and interview him.
- 11 Q. Did you have any success locating him at the apartment on Hallshire?
 - A. No, ma'am.
 - Q. Okay. And then what happened next? Did you look for any other witnesses while you were there at the apartment complex?
- A. Yes. We knocked on the neighbor's doors and interviewed some of the neighbors.
 - Q. Okay. And can you recall for the jury which neighbors that you interviewed?
 - A. Yes, ma'am. I interviewed Christopher

 Robinson who lives in Apartment 132, I believe, and a

 friend of his that was there visiting, Patrick Baker.
 - Q. Okay.
- 25 A. I also interviewed Emanuel Ramirez who

- 1 lives in the upstairs apartment. I think it's
 2 Apartment 233.
 - Q. And how old a person was Emanuel?
 - *A* . Um . . .
- 5 Q. In other words, was he a child? Was he an 6 adult?
 - A. He's a teen. Teenager.
 - Q. Okay. And --
- 9 A. And we also interviewed -- or I'm sorry.
- 10 In apartment 235 we interviewed Mr. Acosta, Alex
- 11 Acosta.

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- 12 Q. Okay. Is he the same person that goes by the nickname Paco?
- A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Did you also have the opportunity to reviewa statement that Sergeant Robert Torres had taken
- 17 | from the defendant the evening before?
- 18 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 19 Q. Okay. And based on -- well, let me go
- 20 back. What was your purpose for going to Texas
- 21 | Children's Hospital that morning or the day of
- 22 | April 1st?
- 23 A. Well, to check on Kamron's condition.
- Q. And what was his status at that time?
- 25 A. It was critical, unstable, and likely to

die as a result of the injuries.

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- Q. That he had sustained?
- A. That he had sustained, yes.
- Q. You told the jury that you've worked many cases involving the death of an infant. So, are you familiar with some of the things that you're looking for in a child abuse case -- in other words, when a child dies by abuse or homicide versus SIDS or some sort of accident?
 - A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Okay. Did you discuss with any medical personnel at Texas Children's whether or not this would be a case involving abuse or homicide?
 - A. Yes, I did.
- Q. Okay. And did your investigation become a potential homicide case at that point?
- 17 A. Yes, ma'am.
 - Q. The explanation that was given by the defendant in the statement to Torres, was it a logical explanation based on the evidence?
- 21 MR. MARTIN: Objection, your Honor.
- 22 Calls for a conclusion.
- 23 THE COURT: Sustained.
