I work at the southeast patrol station. 6 Q. And how long were you assigned at the 7 southeast patrol station? 8 Α. Approximately about three years. 9 Q. What's your current assignment? I still work at southeast patrol. 10 Α. 11 And are you in any kind of specialized unit Q. 12 now or training for a specialized unit? 1.3 Α. No, still patrol. 14 Are you doing any additional training Q. 15 that -- matter of fact, you are attending -- or you 16 were going to attend tonight? 17 Yes, this week I have been attending 18 special response group training. 19 And what is that? 0. 20 They deal with riot control or protests, 21 mass arrests, whenever you have large crowds and you 22 have to control the situation. 23 Let me take you back to February of 2011.

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Were you on duty that day?

Yes, I was.

And were you working with a partner? 1 Q. 2 A . My partner at that time was Officer Kelly. And back on, specifically, February 20, Q. 3 2011, were you dispatched to a suspicious person 4 5 call? 6 A . Yes, we were dispatched to a suspicious 7 person call. What was the location of that call? 8 Q. 9 Α. It was on Belcrest. The address was --5778 Belcrest? 10 Q. 11 Yes, 5778 Belcrest. Yes. A . 12 Q. And when you arrived at the location, who 13 did you speak to? 14 We spoke with Ms. Williams. Α. What was her first name? 15 0. 16 Α. Odessa. 17 So, you spoke to Odessa Williams. Was she Q. the one who called the police to her home? 18 19 A . Yes, she called the police. 20 Q. And when you arrived and spoke to 21 Ms. Williams, did she direct you to her great 22 grandson? 23 She gave us a description and just a brief

description of what -- you know, her grandson and his

name; and we went down the road and found him.

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And what did she want you to do? 1 Q. She wanted us to arrest him because he was 2 A . back at her home. 3 And did she tell you what had happened the 4 5 day before? 6 A . She gave us a short version of what 7 happened and the case number. So, we looked it up on 8 our computer system; and we got most of the information off there. 9 So, you were able to read the previous 10 reports and find out what had been going on? 11 12 A . Yes. Whatever was already reported. 13 Because it wasn't complete, from my understanding. 14 Now, was the case still under 0. 15 investigation? 16 A . Yes, it was. 17 Now, she gave you a description of the Q. Who did you identify the suspect to be? 18 suspect. 19 Jonnie Dent. Α. 20 Q. And do you see him here in the courtroom 21 today? 22 A . Yes, I do. Could you point to him and describe for the 23 Court what he is wearing? 24

JOHNSON) Now, did she direct you to Q. where she last saw the defendant? 8 9 A. Yes. She told us he was walking towards 10 M.L.K., which is just west of where her residence is. And what did you and Officer Kelly do? 11 Q. 12 Α. We drove around the area, and we located 13 him down at Belarbor and M.L.K., which there is a 14 corner store there. 15 And when you found the defendant, what was 0. 16 his demeanor? 17 He was there with a group of people; and as 18 soon as he saw us approaching, he turned around to 19 walk away. He had a hard time keeping his balance; 20 and when we approached him, he just kind of had slurred speech. We detained him flat. 2.1 22 Did it appear to you, based on your 23 training and experience as a police officer, that he 24 was under the influence of some unknown substance?

- Q. As matter of fact, she called you to her house; is that right?

- 25 Q. Now, after you detained the defendant,

where did you take him?

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- We transported him to the central Houston Police Department jail.
- And then what happened once you got to the jail?
- Α. He was screened there by a medical screen like every other prisoner and they actually told us that we had to take him to Ben Taub because he was not responding to them and like he might be having some kind of medical problem or condition.
- And so, when someone that you take to the jail has -- appears to have some type of condition, where do you have to take them?
- They usually get transported to Ben Taub by ambulance.
- Did you transport the defendant to the hospital, or did someone else?
- A . I believe the ambulance transported him, and Officer Kelly was with the ambulance.

- Yes. Α.
- Now, at the time that you detained the 23 defendant, did you check to see if there were any 24 open arrest warrants for Ms. Williams' case on the defendant?

Jose Garcia - October 19, 2012 Direct Examination by Ms. Johnson

Yes, we did. 1 A . 2 Okay. At that time had a warrant been Q. 3 filed yet? 4 Α. Not yet. 5 0. Did you have any contact with the 6 investigating officer, Officer Gibson, about your --7 Α. Yes. We called him on the cell phone. 8 Q. And you told him that you had the suspect 9 in custody? Yes. We advised him that he was in 10 Α. 11 custody. 12 MS. JOHNSON: Pass the witness. THE COURT: Thank you. 1.3 14 Mr. Oliver. 15 MR. OLIVER: Please the Court, yes. 16 CROSS-EXAMINATION 17 (BY MR. OLIVER) Sir, your last name is Q. what, please? 18 19 Garcia. Α. 20 Q. Mr. Garcia, thank you. This is 21 February 20th when you arrested this man, correct? 22 A . Yes, that's correct. 23 Q. The incident was back February 11th, about 24 nine days ago, right? 25 A . Yes.

About nine days prior to that; and you get 1 Q. 2 a call, something about a suspicious person? 3 Α. That's right. And you go out there to check it out, and 4 Q. 5 you met with Ms. Odessa? 6 Α. That's correct. 7 And she directed you to where her grandson Q. 8 was, correct? 9 A . Yes. 10 Okay. And she -- after you picked him up, you brought him back there where she was at her home; 11 12 and she identified that that was her great grandson, correct? 1.3 14 Α. Correct. 15 And did you -- did she tell you that he Q. 16 beat me up? Robbed me? 17 I don't remember. Α. 18 Q. Did she say that? 19 I don't remember her saying -- yeah, I do A . 20 remember her saying -- she did not say the words 21 "beat me up." I don't remember that, but 22 specifically --23 What did she say? "He robbed me"? 24 She said he assaulted her, and then she

gave us the case number. We looked up the

1 information on the computer.

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- Q. She said to you, "That's my great grandson that assaulted me"?
- A. Before we picked him up, she said -because we try to get some information before we just
 go and pick somebody off the street. So, she told us
 that he assaulted her.
- Q. You had information on your screen that said he had assaulted this victim?
- A. After we brought him back, we looked up the report that she gave us the case number for; and it said on there the original statement to the officers --
 - Q. Correct.
- 15 A. -- when they investigated.
- 16 Q. Okay. But she never told you that?
- 17 A. She told us he assaulted her.
- 18 Q. Excuse me?
- 19 A. She told us he assaulted her.
- Q. Okay. Didn't say anything about being beat up, though, correct?
- 22 | A. Not in those words. I don't remember --
- 23 **Q.** Okay.
- 24 A. -- anything about robbing.
- 25 Q. Did she mention robbery?

I don't remember her using the word 1 A . "robbery." 2 Well, at that time there was not a warrant 3 for any robbery; is that correct? 4 That's correct. 5 Α. 6 Q. It was a warrant or something for assault? 7 No. There was no warrant at that time. A . No warrant at all? 8 Q. 9 A . No, there wasn't. 10 Q. So, you took him to the hospital -- or someone took him to the hospital? 11 12 A . Eventually he was taken to the hospital, 13 yes. 14 Okay. You didn't take him to jail because 0. there was no warrant? 15 16 We took him to the jail, and he was 17 rejected by the medical screener there because he was not mentally -- I mean, physically fit to be taken 18 19 into the jail at that time. He had to go to the 20 hospital and get checked out and evaluated. 21 Okay. He just was not in a condition that Q. 22 you could jail him. So, you took him to the 23 hospital?

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When we were at the jail, he was talking to

the medical screener. He fell to the ground, and he

was not responding to anything. He was breathing. 1 He just wasn't responding. 2 Okay. I understand. Thank you. 3 MR. OLIVER: No further questions of 4 5 this witness, Your Honor. 6 THE COURT: Thank you. 7 Any redirect? MS. JOHNSON: Yes, Your Honor. 8 REDIRECT EXAMINATION 9 (BY MS. JOHNSON) Officer Garcia, did it 10 Q. appear as if he was faking at the jail? 11 12 On the way to the jail, he was doing the same thing, like he would look around every few 13 14 minutes to see where he was going. 15 Now, just to be clear, after reviewing the 16 offense report, this didn't happen 11 days before you arrested him. This happened on February 19th. Is 17 18 that what the report says? 19 MS. JOHNSON: May I approach the 20 witness? 2.1 THE COURT: Granted. 22 Q. (BY MS. JOHNSON) After looking at the 23 report, does that refresh your memory? That's correct. Documented that the 24 incident occurred the day before, on the 19th. 25

And you dispatched and called this was by 1 Q. 2 Ms. Williams on the 20th, the next day; is that 3 right? That's right. 4 Α. 5 And she gave you the case number that she Q. 6 was given the day before, right? 7 Α. That's correct. It was written on an HPD 8 case slip. 9 MS. JOHNSON: I pass the witness. 10 MR. OLIVER: Just a couple of questions, Your Honor, if I might, please. 11 12 RECROSS-EXAMINATION 13 Q. (BY MR. OLIVER) You said he was acting crazy like or something. You think he might have 14 15 been faking or what? 16 When we approached him at the corner store, 17 he saw us; and he tried to walk away. We detained 18 him under suspicion that he was intoxicated, brought 19 him back for further investigation in regards to what Ms. Williams called about. 20 2.1 While we were there, he became 22 nonresponsive, slumped his head down and started 23 drooling. Fire department, HPD, checked him out and 24 told us he appears normal, cleared him for

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transportation.
