1 knife in one pocket and the alleged narcotics in the 2 other. 3 My argument is going to be, essentially, 4 this was a search pursuant to an illegal arrest. 5 Alternatively, that if this is a detention, then the 6 search of his pockets exceeds the scope of a 7 permissible pat-down and entry into a pocket to 8 recover a weapon, Your Honor. 9 THE COURT: Okay. His front pants pockets, they had articles in them which we weren't sure what they were. Felt items that, I 5 quess, could be conceived as weapons. I knew the alleged weapon that was used in the offense was small and could 6 7 fit in a pocket. So, when I felt something that could be 8 those items, or could be a weapon, that's when we went in, turned it inside out. So, what we're talking about now is you are 10 Q. talking about a pat-down search; is that correct? 11 12 Α. Correct. 13 And did you say you felt that knife before you Q. 14 went into the pocket? 15 Α. Yes. 16 Were you sure it was a weapon or no? Q.. 17 Was not sure. Α. 18 Now, the pills were in the other pocket; is Q. 19 that correct? 20 Α. Correct. 2.1 And you would agree with me that that doesn't Q. 22 feel like a weapon, correct? 23 I didn't know what it was. 24 Precisely. It did not feel like a weapon, 0. 25 correct?

- A. Right, I did not know what it was.
- Q. Well, again, Officer Glover, you're allowed to go get things in pockets that feel like weapons during a pat-down, correct?

- Q. Now, things that you don't know whether it's a weapon, that's not allowed, correct?
