ANTHONY JANKE - October 3, 2011 Direct Examination by Mr. Baldassano

1 0. And going back to October 19th of 2007, were 2 you working there at the Houston Fire Department? 3 Α. Yes, sir, I was. 4 What station were you assigned to? Q. 5 Station 68. A . 6 0. And were you driving the pumper or the truck? 7 Neither one. I was riding as acting captain on Α. 8 Engine 68 that day. 9 Q. So you're on Engine 68. Is this a pumper? 10 Yes, sir, it's a pumper. A . 11 You're also an EMT? Q. 12 Α. I'm a paramedic. What does that entail, being a paramedic? 13 Q. 14 Α. Lifesaving. You're taught more advanced 15 procedures as an advanced cardiac life support, treating 16 cardiac arrest, giving medications, intubating patients. 17 0. A step up from EMT? Yes, sir. 18 Α. 19 How long have you been a paramedic? 0. 20 Α. Thirteen years. 21 On your fire engine or this apparatus, how many 0. 22 people are with you? 23 There is three other people on the apparatus. Α. 24 What are their jobs? Q.

The EO, as I said earlier, drives and operates

- Q. And so that day you were the acting captain, correct?
 - A. Yes, sir.

- Q. All right. Who was that, if you know?
- A. I don't recall who was driving that day. We -- a lot of times when our captain will call in sick or out on vacation, we play multiple chairs on the apparatuses.
- Q. So there is four firefighters. You're the captain. There is a guy driving and two firefighters in the back. Do you recall what the call was? That is, on the way there, what were you thinking, or what had you heard the call was?
- A. They said that it was a mini strip center or, something to that effect, on fire.
 - Q. And do you remember this fire?
- 20 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And I'm assuming you go to a lot of fires,right?
- 23 A. Now that I'm -- yes, sir. Now that I drive 24 Ladder 51, I do, yes, sir.
- 25 Q. Do you remember when you arrived at the scene

if there were other fire engines there already?

A. Yes, sir, there was.

- Q. All right. And where did you set up, or where did your apparatus go?
- A. We were on about middle of the building on the Rampart side.
- Q. Push hard on the thing, and let me see if I can get that in there. Push on the screen.
- A. Touch the screen? Right about right in this area right here is where we set up.
- Q. And what was your function, as you understood it?
 - A. We were attached to Ladder 28 for search.
- ${\it Q.}$ Tell us about what the procedure is for a Houston firefighter that's assigned to do a search at a fire.
- A. We are to go in -- usually if you're searching, you're in front of the fire suppression. Because if you introduce water onto the fire and there is victims inside the fire, they can be burnt. So we go inside first, and we pull out those victims before we get there.
- Q. So you actually run into a fire to get victims, but not to put out the fire?
- 25 A. No, sir, not if you're on the search team.

- Q. And is that very hazardous?
- A. Quite.

- Q. What kind of gear are you wearing when you do one of these searches?
- A. It's called bunker gear. It has a Kevlar fire resistance outer shell. And it has an inner shell that is steam resistent to keep us from, when we introduce the water to the fire, we don't get burned by the steam. Along with that we have a hood that goes around on your head and a helmet to keep things from breaking your head open. And we carry a bottle of air in it, and we have a mask on so we can breathe air.
- Q. And the typical scene, when you get into a fire scene, can you see anything?
- A. Not if it's a fully-blown fire, not usually. Usually there is a lot of smoke, and we have what is known as a thermal energy camera that helps us get through it.
 - Q. What does that do?
- A. It picks out the hot and the cold.
- 21 Differentiates between hot and cold objects.
- Q. Do you bring any kind of firefighting equipment with you, or are you just looking for people and going on your own?
- 25 A. If you're searching, you'll bring the thermal

engine camera. The firefighters will bring in an axe, a halogen tool, some type of tools. Because then if we have to crawl -- usually what we do is we'll crawl, and we can use that tool to search out and extend out so we don't get off the wall and get disoriented when we're in a smoke-filled building.

- Q. So you're on your hands and knees?
- A. Yes. When you go in search and there is heavy smoke back down, heavy heat back down, yes, sir, we're on our hands and needs when we go in.
 - Q. Okay. Feeling the wall?

- A. We stay on the wall. That way we don't get disoriented and we can make our way back out if we need to.
 - Q. Any danger of things falling on you?
- A. Yes, sir. Roof collapses is always a danger we face.
- Q. Okay. How many people in this fire on October 19th at Rampart were doing what you were doing; that is, a primary search?
- A. There was six of us; three off of Ladder 28 on my side of the building, that I know of, three on Ladder 28 and three on Engine 68.
- Q. Were you all working into going into the same place at the same time, or were you hitting different

- A. Ladder 28 would force entry and go in. And if it was clear, if they told us there was no victims, we would go to the next room and we would go in while they were opening the next door.
- Q. So they're the door openers, and you're the inside people?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. How many people are going in with you?
- A. I have myself and two others.
- Q. Have you done a lot of this where you're the primary searcher?
- 13 A. Yes, sir, I have.
 - Q. Can you tell us in that building what -- were you working the same side that you were parked on; that is, on the Rampart Street side?
 - A. Yes, sir, we were.
 - Q. And where did you start trying to get into these doors?
 - A. We were instructed -- right down here is a tire store, if I remember correctly. And that's where we caught up with Ladder 28. They had already searched that area, and they were coming out when we caught up with them. So our first entry would have been right in this area right here, this next door.

- Now have you taken a look at the fire at this 0. point, or are you just messing around with the front on Rampart Street?
- No, sir. We were just working Rampart Street. We didn't go -- from what I understand, we could see smoke coming from the backside over here, but we couldn't see any fire where we were.
- 0. Did you see any active fire on the far right side on the Rampart Street side?

- A. Once you cut that lock, it will open up.
- 18 Q. How long does it take to cut it?
- A. I don't know. Ten, fifteen seconds. It

 aggressive blade on the saw, and it cuts fairly quick.

I would say it was maybe 160 -- 150, 160 degrees, something like that.
- Q. Like a summer day in Houston?
- A. Pretty much, yes, sir, summer day in Houston.

 But again, it was thick smoke and it was dark. We didn't have lights on the inside. We had our flashlights, but we didn't have lights. And I'm scanning the room with the TIC, the thermal imaging camera, to try to see if there's anything in there. And I happened to look down, and there was a set of feet right there.
- Q. Okay. And what did you do when you saw a set of feet on the ground?

- I told two firefighters behind me, we need to Α. 2 get him out. I got on the radio to command and told them we were bringing a victim out on the Rampart side. And they had HCLS show up.
 - Okay. I'm going to show you quickly, I guess, 0. a door coming in. Is this an accurate depiction of when you came into that building and went back out to where they sawed the lock off?
 - Α. Yes, sir.
