It's been 27 and a half years. 20 Q. Are you a certified peace officer in the 21 state of Texas? 22 Α. Yes. Currently what district are you assigned 23 Q. 24 to? 25 Currently I'm assigned to the financial Α.

- crimes unit of the Harris County Sheriff's Office.

  How long have you been in that division?
  - A. Approximately eight months.

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- Q. Prior to that where were you assigned?
- A. The crimes against children unit.
  - Q. And how long were you in that division?
  - A. Approximately three years.
- Q. In addition to the academy and getting licensed in the state of Texas, what sort of additional training or on-the-job experience do you have that qualifies you to be in the crimes against children division or an investigator?
- A. Yes. Usually, on a monthly basis we're training in the Children's Assessment Center.

  Usually on a monthly basis, we're required to have 40 hours of training mandated every year.
  - Q. Okay. Now, while in the crimes against children division, what all types of cases did you investigate?
  - A. We investigate any types of abuse, neglect, assaults against children under the age of 15.
    - Q. Do you -- physical assaults? Sexual?
- A. Physical/sexual assaults, yes, ma'am.
- Q. Okay. Were you assigned to that division on February 8th of 2013?

1 Α. Yes. Were you assigned a case involving a baby 2 Q. named Josiah Fisher? 3 Α. Yes. 4 5 And when were you assigned to that case? 0. 6 Α. I was assigned to the case on February 8, 7 2013. 8 Q. What was the first thing that you did when you were assigned to the case? 9 First thing I did, I was actually the 10 Α. 11 person on call. I was notified by our watch command 12 dispatch, spoke to the deputy on the scene; and I immediately -- he advised me of the situation. 13 14 went to Texas Children's Hospital. Is it routine for the on-call investigator 15 Q. 16 to go to the hospital? 17 Α. No. 18 Q. Why did you attend the hospital in this instance? 19 20 Α. Due to the sustained injuries, which was 21 relayed to me by the reporting deputy and also EMS 22 advised him. 23 Okay. So, in this particular case, it was Q. 24 important to make it to the hospital immediately?

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Α.

Yes.

- Q. Okay. Now, while at the hospital, without going into what anybody said, were you given information from doctors and medical staff as to the status of Josiah Fisher?
  - A. Yes.

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- Q. And how old was Josiah on that day?
- A. I believe 15 weeks. 15 weeks old.
- Q. Fifteen days, perhaps?
- A. Sorry. 15 days. I apologize. Yes.
- Q. Okay. When you have a case where you have a 15-day-old baby or any child that is not -- that is nonverbal or can't speak due to the injuries sustained, what is one of the most immediate goals of your investigation?
- A. The most immediate goals are to establish number one, the time line of the symptoms of the injuries, also, the persons who had contact with the child.
- Q. Would it be fair to say that in many cases there is more than one person that possibly has contact with a child that needs to be investigated?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Now, in this case, how did you start? What did you start with?
  - A. Basically, what I started with was I

obtained witness information which was provided by 1 the original report responding deputy. I obtained 2 statements from witnesses who saw the child. 3 Okay. Now, when you were actually at the 4 5 hospital, were there individuals that you spoke with and interviewed? 6 7 Α. Yes. 8 Q. Okay. And who did you talk to at the hospital? 9 It was one, the defendant. 10 Α. 11 And when you say "the defendant," who are 0. 12 you talking about? 13 Α. About Timothy Fisher. 14 0. Okay. Do you see Timothy Fisher in the 15 courtroom today? 16 Α. Yes. Could you point to him and identify him by 17 an article of clothing? 18 19 Α. Yes. That would be him in the blue shirt, 20 blue tie. 2.1 MS. BYRNE: May the witness reflect --22 may the record reflect the witness has identified the 23 defendant? 24 THE COURT: Yes, ma'am. 25 (Defendant Identified)

(BY MS. BYRNE) Did you talk to other staff 1 0. and members from Child Protective Services at the 2 hospital, as well? 3 Α. Yes. 4 And, again, without going into what all of 5 0. 6 these individuals said, what was the purpose in 7 talking to them on that date? 8 Α. The purpose was to see if the statements given to them were consistent with what I obtained. 9 In addition to speaking with the defendant, 10 11 did you also ask for consent to search his residence? 12 Α. Yes. 13 Q. And did he voluntarily do that? 14 Α. Yes. 15 Okay. And he was cooperative? Q. 16 Α. Yes. 17 Okay. Q. 18 MS. BYRNE: Permission to approach the witness? 19 20 THE COURT: Yes, ma'am. 2.1 (BY MS. BYRNE) First, I'm going to show you Q. 22 what's marked as State's Exhibit No. 57. Do you 23 recognize the person in State's 57? 24 Α. Yes.

And does State's 57 fairly and accurately

- 19 Q. Okay. Do State's 59 through 62 fairly and 20 accurately depict what they purport to show?
- 21 A. Yes.

And how long were you at the Q. 16 hospital before you went to the original location on Five Forks? 17 18 *A* . I was there approximately -- it says 2100, 19 which is 9:00. So, I was there approximately two or three hours. 20 2.1 Did you go to the residence that night or Q. 22 on a different day? 23 On a different date. Α. 24 Okay. And do you recall approximately when Q. this was? 25

That was on the following day, February the 1 Α. 9th. 2 Okay. And where was the defendant's 3 0. residence located? 4 5 Α. The residence was located at 7310, I 6 believe, Five Forks, Spring, Texas. 7 Is that located in Harris County, Texas? 0. 8 Α. Yes. Just generally describe the outside of the 9 Q. residence for us, showing you State's Exhibit No. 62. 10 11 The outside of the residence appeared to be 12 an -- either a singlewide or doublewide mobile --13 mobile home located on actually some farm property. 14 0. Do you recall whether or not the defendant was present when you searched the residence? 15 16 Α. He was not present. Okay. Showing you State's Exhibit No. 59, 17 Q. 18 what are we looking at here? I believe that was the -- that was the bed. 19 Α. 20 Q. Okay. 2.1 I can't recall whether this was the Α. 22 defendant's bed or the older child's bed. 23 Okay. Well, do you see what's right down Q. 24 here? 25 Α. Yes.

Okay. What are we looking at in State's 1 Q. Exhibit 61? 2 That is, I guess, a bassinet or carrier. 3 Α. Okay. And based on your investigation, did 4 Q. you determine whether or not that is where the baby 5 6 slept? 7 Α. Yes. 8 Q. Or one of the locations where the baby would have slept? 9 Α. 10 Yes. 11 Now, if you can tell, you see this clothing in the corner back here? 12 13 Α. Yes. 14 Does that appear to be baby clothing with 15 little dog bones and dogs on it? 16 Α. Yes. And State's Exhibit No. 60, what are we 17 Q. looking at here? 18 That is also a bed. 19 Α. 20 Q. Okay. And what kind of toys do you see on 21 the dresser near the bed? 22 Α. Looks to be toddler toys. 23 Q. Okay. 24 Α. Baby toys.

Are you familiar with Sponge Bob Square

Pants? 1 Yes, Sponge Bob, some type of toy. 2 Α. Do you know whether or not this is a 3 0. 6-year-old's bed? 4 5 Α. No. 6 Q. Okay. Now, while searching the home, I 7 mean, you are there to investigate injury to a child, 8 correct? 9 Α. Yes. 10 Q. Okay. Was there anything that you observed 11 that you --12 MS. BYRNE: May we approach? THE COURT: 13 Okay. 14 (At the Bench) 15 MS. BYRNE: Before I started, I was 16 going to get into where he observed the synthetic marijuana in the residence. And at the time -- at 17 the time we didn't file charges on that, as far as 18 the State is concerned, because we couldn't determine 19 20 whether any of the components in it were even 2.1 unlawful.
