1 MS. STABE: Thank you, Your Honor. 2 JOHN O'BRIEN, having been first duly sworn, testified as follows: 3 DIRECT EXAMINATION 4 5 0. (BY MS. STABE) Deputy, can you please introduce 6 yourself to the jury? 7 I'm John O'Brien. I work for the Harris County Α. 8 Sheriff's Department. I've been employed with the Harris 9 County Sheriff's Department for 16 years. I'm currently assigned to HIDTA and I've been there for seven years. 10 11 Can you explain to the jury what HIDTA is? 0. Α. 12 High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area. What do you do as a HIDTA task force officer? 13 Q. 14 We're responsible for large-scale narcotics Α. investigations, tasked to the DEA. 15 16 0. Sorry. You can continue. We do multijurisdictional large-scale narcotics 17 A. 18 investigations throughout the state of Texas and throughout the United States. 19 20 Q. All right. What other agencies do you work with? 21 Houston Police Department, FBI, DEA, Homeland Α. 22 Security, Texas Department of Public Safety, Montgomery 23 County, Fort Bend County and Wharton County. 24 0. So a lot of agencies? 25 A. Yes, ma'am.

- Q. And, I mean, are you guys always working together on everything or are there more agencies to work with than others?
- A. We're usually working always together on a multijurisdictional level.
- Q. Okay. And how is it that you are working together? Like, what does each agency do? How do they contribute to the task force?
- 9 A. Depending on what the investigation is, say if it's
 10 in Harris County, usually I'll take the lead or another
 11 Harris County officer will take the lead. If it's in
 12 Montgomery County, the Montgomery County officer will take
 13 the lead but we do all of our own investigations until we
 14 get to prosecutorial.
 - Q. And on April 16th, 2013, were you on duty that day?
- 16 A. Yes, ma'am.

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- 17 Q. And were you a certified peace officer at the time?
- 18 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 19 Q. And you still are today, right?
- A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. And what was the shift you were working? Do you recall?
- A. I have -- we don't have a set shift. We just -when we're called, we go to work. We work a eight-hour day,
 usually from 9:00 to 5:00, and I think on that day we were

1 | working from noon until 8:00 PM.

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- Q. Okay. And on that day, were you stationed at a particular area?
 - A. I was in a marked Harris County vehicle. I was in full uniform and I was stationed at -- in the District 3 area, in the area of I-10 and Sheldon Road.
- MS. STABE: Okay. Your Honor, may I approach the, I guess, projector?

THE COURT: Yes.

- Q. (BY MS. STABE) Okay. I'm showing you what's been admitted as State's Exhibit No. 2. And so, is this the area that we're talking about, I-10 and Sheldon area shown here?
 - A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Okay. And so, what location were you stationed at at that time?
 - A. I was in a Shell gas station, which would be in the northeast corner of the picture.
- 18 Q. Okay. And if you -- you can actually, if you touch 19 that screen, it will show up a mark on there.
- 20 A. Oh, okay. I was at this gas station right here at Sheldon Road and East Freeway.
- Q. Okay. And you're in a marked patrol unit with -
 did you have a partner at the time?
 - A. Yes, Deputy Santos.
- Q. Okay. And that's who we just saw in here earlier?

1 A. Yes, ma'am. 2 0. Is he your partner all the time? 3 Α. Yes, ma'am. How long have y'all been working together as 4 0. 5 partners? 6 A. Probably four years now. 7 Okay. And around 7:30 that evening, did you get 0. 8 any type of information about making a traffic stop? 9 Α. Yes, ma'am, we did. 10 0. Okay. What agency did that come from? 11 The FBI. Α. 12 0. Okay. So, you were given -- was it, like, a tip 13 or --14 The FBI told us to be on the lookout for a -- I A. would have to refer to my report but it was, I think, a 15 16 black Chrysler vehicle. 17 0. Okay. 18 MS. STABE: May I approach the witness, Your 19 Honor? 20 THE COURT: You may. 21 (BY MS. STABE) Here's a copy of your report if you 0. 22 need to refresh your memory. Thank you, ma'am. Yeah, it was a four-door black 23 Α. 24 Chrysler Cirrus with Texas tag 0X4 Robert 326. 25 Q. Okay. And so, you got a tip from the FBI and, I

- mean, when you get that type of tip to look for a car, what is it your job to do?
 - A. To look for the car and establish probable cause to stop the vehicle.
 - Q. Okay. And so, what did you do in this case or what probable cause did you see that allowed you to stop this vehicle?
 - A. Deputy Santos and I were stationed at the Shell station at I-10 and Sheldon Road. We observed the vehicle pass underneath Shelton traveling northbound and run the red light on the north side of the freeway going north on Sheldon Road.
 - Q. Okay. And running a red light, is that a traffic violation?
 - A. It's a traffic violation.
- 16 Q. Okay. And so, that gives you probable cause to pull a car over?
- 18 A. Yes, ma'am.

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- 19 Q. Now, are you the driver or the passenger of the 20 patrol car?
- 21 A. I was the driver that day.
- Q. What do you do? Do you activate your lights and sirens? What do you do?
- A. We go behind the vehicle, we ran the registration and I activated my emergency equipment just north of the

1 Shell station on Sheldon Road.

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- Q. Okay. And did that car pull over right away or did it take awhile?
 - A. The vehicle traveled approximately a quarter mile maybe to the 700 block of Sheldon Road and pulled into a convenience store.
 - Q. Okay. And while it was driving down Sheldon Road, did you ever see at any time, you know, like, the driver making any furtive movements?
- A. No, ma'am.
- Q. Did you ever see anything coming out of the driver's side window, anything thrown out of there?
- 13 A. No, ma'am.
 - Q. What was the weather like that day?
- 15 A. It was drizzling rain at the time of the traffic 16 stop.
- 17 Q. Okay. And was it still daylight, like --
- 18 A. It was still daylight. It was around 7:30, so it
 19 was getting dark but there was still adequate light to see.
- Q. Okay. Once this car pulled into this convenience store parking lot, what did you do?
- 22 A. I made a contact with the driver of the vehicle, 23 Mr. Edward Davis.
- 24 O. That was the driver?
- 25 A. Yes, ma'am.

1 0. Okay. How many people were in the car? 2 Α. Two people. And so, Edward Davis was the driver? 3 Q. Edward Davis. 4 Α. 5 Was there a passenger then? Q. 6 Α. Yes, there was. 7 Where was the passenger seated? 0. 8 A. In the passenger front seat. 9 Do you see that passenger in the courtroom today? Q. 10 A. I do. Could you please point to him and identify an 11 Q. 12 article of clothing he's wearing? 13 A. Gray shirt. 14 MS. STABE: May the record reflect the witness has identified the defendant? 15 16 THE COURT: It will. 17 (BY MS. STABE) Oh, let me go back. Where this 18 traffic stop occurred, you said the 700 block of Sheldon 19 Road? 20 A . Yes, ma'am. 21 0. Is that in Harris County, Texas? 22 Α. It is, ma'am. 23 All right. So, once you pulled the car over, you 0. 24 said you made contact with the driver, Edward Davis? 25 Α. Yes, ma'am.

0. What do you do when you first make contact with 1 someone on a traffic stop? 2 I advise them why the traffic stop was made, ask 3 them for their license and registration of the vehicle. 4 5 Okay. So, in this situation, did the traffic stop 6 go, you know, normally or did something happen that, you 7 know, kind of changed the situation? 8 Α. The traffic stop went normal. As I approached the 9 driver's side, made contact with Mr. Edward, the passenger was making furtive movements, pulling something out of his 10 11 pocket and putting it between the seat and the center 12 console. 13 MR. AYERS: I'm going to object. Is he saying 14 he saw this? 15 THE COURT: You'll get him on cross. 16 MR. AYERS: All right. 17 0. (BY MS. STABE) And you saw this yourself? 18 A . Yes, I saw this myself. 19 0. Okay. 20 Α. With my own eyes. 21 0. Okay. So, you're on the driver's side looking through the driver's side window? 22 23 Α. Yes, ma'am, I am. Did the driver roll the window down?

The window was all the way down.

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Q.

Α.

- Q. Okay. So you're looking through -- so you can see -- you can see the front seat passenger?
 - A. Yes, ma'am.

- Q. And you said -- what did you observe?
- A. I observed Mr. Penton place an unknown object between the front seat and the center console of the vehicle.
- Q. Okay. And, I mean, did you -- did you see where it came from? Like --
 - A. From him -- his persons.
- Q. Okay. Like, from a pocket? From a shirt?
- A. From between his waist -- at his waistline. Could have been his pocket, could have been in his waistband. I'm not sure of that, ma'am.
- Q. Okay. But you saw him reaching with his hands to his body and then putting it --
- 17 A. Yes, ma'am.
 - Q. Okay. So after you see this, what do you do?
 - A. I drew my sidearm and I placed it in the direction of Mr. Penton and I said, Let me see your hands, let me see your hands, at which time he proceeded to pull something else out and place it between the center console. That's when my partner was able to get control of Mr. Penton and place him in restraints.
 - Q. While this is going on, is the defendant saying

- 1 anything?
- 2 A. He was yelling the whole time we were talking to
- 3 him.

- Q. Okay.
- 5 A. Or trying to restrain him.
- 6 Q. What was he saying? I know he's yelling but --
- 7 A. That we were the man and we were going to rob him, 8 supposibly (sic).
- 9 Q. Okay. What about the driver? What's his demeanor like?
- 11 A. The driver was very calm. He followed
- 12 instructions. He did not pose a threat to me at any point.
- 13 Q. Okay. No threats were made?
- 14 A. No, ma'am.
- 15 Q. Very compliant?
- 16 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Why is it that you also pulled your duty weapon when you saw the defendant --
- 19 A. Because I didn't know what he was doing at the 20 time.
- Q. Where on his body or where at his body did you point your firearm?
- 23 A. Either in the neck or the -- neck or the head.
- Q. Okay. Why -- I mean, how were you --
- 25 A. My partner -- a car has front windows. As a law

- enforcement officer, you're accountable for anything you do.

 You're accountable for your bullets. If I was to have to do

 something, I would have to be accountable for the bullet

 coming out of my gun. My partner was positioned in the

 passenger side window, so I knew if I had to take action, I

 needed to be accountable for the bullet that I was going to

 have to, you know, put down range.
 - Q. Okay. So, how were you positioned in order to, I guess, follow that protocol?
 - A. I had the driver of the vehicle forced back with my left hand, I had my pistol through the window towards the -- Mr. Penton's left side.
 - Q. Okay. What happens after that?
 - A. My partner, Deputy Santos, is able to take control of Mr. Penton, placed him in restraints, I took the driver and place him in restraints, Deputy Santos brought Penton back to the marked patrol car, I pat-searched the driver and placed him outside between my marked patrol vehicle and the vehicle they were operating.
 - Q. So he's -- this Edward Davis, he's standing?
 - A. Yes, ma'am, he is.
- 22 Q. In between the two cars?
- A. Yes, ma'am.

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- 24 | Q. So he wasn't put in the patrol car?
- 25 A. No, ma'am.

1 0. And why is it that you put him also in handcuffs? 2 For officer safety. Α. Okay. When you patted him down, did you find any 3 0. drugs or any contraband on Edward Davis? 4 5 Α. No, ma'am. 6 0. Okay. And did you assist in searching the car at 7 all? 8 Α. No, ma'am, I did not. 9 Okay. And let me go back. Did you talk to Edward Q. Davis at all? 10 11 Yes, ma'am, I did. A . 12 0. Okay. When you're talking to him, I mean, is it 13 typical that you try to get consent from someone to search? 14 A. Yes, ma'am, it is. Okay. Why did you -- or did you ask for consent to 15 0. 16 search in this case? The reason for -- because they threw -- or 17 18 Mr. Penton threw something into the center console between 19 the center console and the front seat. 20 Q. Okay. Making a furtive movement, trying to hide 21

something, which later we discovered was methamphetamines.

Okay. So, did you ask that of the driver, Edward

A. The driver, yes.

Davis, for consent?

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- 1 Okay. Why did you ask Edward Davis? 0. 2 Because operating -- owner/operator of the vehicle Α. that we stopped. 3 Okay. And did you get consent to search the car? 4 0. 5 Α. I did, ma'am. 6 0. Okay. Once the car is searched, do you find 7 anything? 8 Α. Deputy Santos searched the car. 9 MR. AYERS: Your Honor, I'm going to have to He said he didn't search the car. 10 object. 11 THE COURT: Sustained. The answer was a 12 yes-or-no response, please. 13 Α. No, ma'am. 14 (BY MS. STABE) Where are you standing whenever --0. 15 I'm standing outside my marked patrol vehicle, 16 placed between my marked patrol vehicle and the vehicle which we stopped, watching my patrol vehicle, Mr. Davis and 17 18 my partner. 19 Why are you in that position? 0. 20 Α. Officer safety. 21 Okay. So at any time did you go back into the 0.
- 24 0.

patrol car and sit and hang out in the car?

And also during this time, you said Edward Davis is still out --

Okay. So, you know, any statements that the 19 defendant made to Deputy Santos, you were not involved in that interaction? 20 2.1 Yes, ma'am. Α. 22 Q. Okay. 23 MS. STABE: May I approach the witness, Your 24 Honor? 25 THE COURT: You may.

- 0. (BY MS. STABE) Did you bring something with you 1 2 today? I did, ma'am. 3 Α. Okay. So, I'm going to mark this as State's 4 0. 5 Exhibit No. 3. And without going into yet what the contents 6 are, how do you recognize State's Exhibit No. 3? 7 This property tag has my name and my ID number on Α. 8 it from the report dated on the day that we arrested Forest Penton. 9 10 0. Okay. And is there anything else, any other identifying marks on State's Exhibit No. 3 that you 11 12 recognize? My first initial is on all the seals, which is 13 Α. 14 policy for us to do when we're submitting evidence to the laboratory. 15
- 16 Q. Okay. And so, what then would be State's Exhibit
 - A. It would be 30 grams of methamphetamine.
- 19 *Q*. Okay.

 - Q. Okay. Can we open State's Exhibit 3?
- 10 A. You can open it.
- 11 Q. Okay. So we're looking at the contents of State's
 12 Exhibit No. 3. Do you recognize those contents?
- 13 A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Okay. Is this the same evidence that you and
 Deputy Santos collected on the scene and that you tagged
 into the property room?
- 17 A. It is, ma'am.
- Q. And from the time that you tagged it into the property room -- sorry. From the time you collected it to the time you tagged it in the property room, was it tampered with in any way?
- 22 A. No, ma'am.
- 23 Q. And then did you actually --
- 24 A. It was collected and --
- 25 Q. Okay. Whenever you picked this up from the

property room, you were the person that brought it here to 1 2 court today? 3 Α. Yes, ma'am. And had it been tampered with or has it been 4 0. 5 tampered with in any way from the time you picked it up till 6 you brought it to court? 7 It hasn't been tampered with. It has been tested. Α. 8 0. Okay. 9 As you can see by the medical examiner's label and Α. the initials. 10 11 0. Okay. 12 THE COURT: Could you approach for just a 13 moment, please? 14 (At the bench, on the record.) 15 THE COURT: I'm probably just not hearing well 16 but are you sometimes calling Santos Sanchez? MS. STABE: I didn't think that I did. 17 THE COURT: Okay. The court reporter doesn't 18 19 think so. I just heard it wrong. 20 (End of discussion at the bench.) (BY MS. STABE) And would you mind reading for the 21 0. 22 jury -- on the bag that's contained in State's Exhibit No. 23 3, are there some identifying numbers on that bag? 24 Α. Yes, ma'am, there's a Harris County case number. 25 Q. Okay. What is that?

1 A. It's HC1350706. 2 0. Is that also present on the tag that you put on the 3 baq? 4 Yes, ma'am. A. 5 0. Okay. And so, what is the case number that's on 6 that bag? 7 Α. 1350706. 8 0. Is there any other number or laboratory case number on the bag? 9 There's a Harris County medical examiner's 10 Α. 11 laboratory number. 12 What is that? 0. 13 IFS13-03995. Α. 14 Do you see that number also present on the evidence 0. 15 here, State's Exhibit No. 3? 16 Yes, ma'am, it's the Harris County forensic lab number, IFS13-03995. 17 18 Q. Okay. And so, that's present on both the actual evidence --19 20 Α. Yes, ma'am. 2.1 -- and on the bag that they were located in? 0. 22 A . Yes, ma'am. 23 Okay. Why is that number important? 0. 24 Α. Our Harris County case number is the same case

number that we submit our laboratory evidence to. And on

- theirs, it's the number that they use to do a substance test to give you a -
 Q. To give the result?
 - A. Yes, ma'am.

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- Q. Okay. So those are both unique numbers that identify both the case and then the unique lab number that links the substance with this case?
- A. Yes, ma'am.
 - Q. Okay. So after this evidence was collected and tagged, did you have any other role that you played in this case or investigation?
- 12 A. No, ma'am.
- 13 MS. STABE: I'll pass the witness, Your Honor.
- 14 MR. AYERS: A few questions, Judge.

CROSS-EXAMINATION

- 16 Q. (BY MR. AYERS) It's Deputy O'Brien; is that
 17 correct?
- 18 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Deputy O'Brien, referring back to April 16th, 2013,

- 13 A. It wasn't the luck of the draw. The FBI was
 14 probably watching it.
- 15 Q. All right. But they had tipped you off to stop 16 this car, right?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. But they didn't have any probable cause. They said
 19 you have to come up with your own, right?
- 20 A. Yes.
- Q. So as you testified, maybe you follow them, you
 wait for a traffic stop, you wait for them to commit a
 traffic violation, you pull them over, that's your probable
 cause to stop them, right?
- 25 A. Right.

- 1 Q. In this case you didn't actually have to wait very
 2 long, right?
 - A. That's right.
- Q. Because you're saying that they ran a red light right in front of you?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. So, pretty much all but immediate, from the time
 you saw them, you were able to develop your PC and stop them
 for running a red light?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. And certainly you were dealing with the driver of the car, correct?
- 13 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And he was never issued any citations or anything like that, correct?
- 16 A. No, sir.
- 17 *Q.* Never arrested?
- 18 A. No, sir.
- 19 Q. Never charged with anything?
- 20 A. No, sir.
- 21 O. Was released at the scene with the car?
- 22 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And you certainly know you guys have the ability at the scene to determine who owns the car, right?
- 25 A. Yes, sir.

John O'Brien - May 14, 2014 Cross-Examination by Mr. Ayers

- Q. That was not Forest Penton's car. It was the driver's car, correct?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. He owned the car. All right. Now, oh, by the way, on the traffic stop in your cars you have video cameras. Do you have any video of them running the red light and the traffic stop and all that?
 - A. Our video camera doesn't work in that car, no, sir.
 - Q. Hasn't worked for four years?
- 10 A. Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. So you never have any video of anything you do in 2 your job?
- 13 A. No, sir.
- Q. Okay. Now, oh, and before you testified today, I assume you had an opportunity to talk to Deputy Santos?
 - A. We talk every day. We're partners.
- 17 Q. Of course. And y'all talk about testifying in this 18 case and what happened, right?
- 19 A. Yes.
- Q. And certainly you and Deputy Santos together have an opportunity to sit down with the prosecutor before you testified, correct?
- A. We did.
- Q. And go over the offense report, right?
- 25 A. We did.

John O'Brien - May 14, 2014 Cross-Examination by Mr. Ayers

1 Deputy Santos' report in preparation to testify today? 2 A . I have read his report. And you and he and the prosecutor sat down and you 3 0. 4 went through this report, didn't you? We did. 5 Α.
