I would say so. 4 Α 5 And the photographs we see starting with the top 6 left of Petitioner's Exhibit 142, what are we looking at 7 in that photograph? 8 You are looking directly on the northbound. 9 And if you continue northbound in that 10 photograph, which way does the road turn? To your left or 11 to your right? 12 It's going -- at this location, it's going to 13 turn to your right towards Highway 6. 14 And if you take the photograph in the bottom of Q Petitioner's Exhibit 142, is that a reverse angle? 15 16 Α Yes. Okay. Can you see which way the road turns in 17 18 that bottom right picture? 19 Α Yes. 20 And, again, are these reverse photographs of the 21 same location? 22 Yes, they are. 23 And can you describe to the jury what the road 24 does? Is it a straight road at this location? 25 That road is -- has -- I would call it a Α No.

45-degree angle turn when they meet. It's the same road, however, it's a straight path that makes a very tight turn in front of the airport, at the corner of the airport. It is a 45-degree angle. It's very narrow, very tight.

- Q And I would like to direct your attention now to October 20th of 2013 in the midmorning hours of that Sunday. Were you on patrol?
- A Yes, I was.
 - Q And where were you patrolling?
- 10 A Yes, I was.

 13 Which means, I do the complete patrol of the surrounding

 - Q And as you were driving around the airport depicted in Petitioner's Exhibit 142, what did you see?
 - A Well, I saw a vehicle that was off the road. It was off of a ditch into, near by a fence. It seems to me there was an accident at first.
 - Q And what did you do?
 - A Well, thinking it was an accident, I pulled over and I checked for a passenger or a driver in the vehicle to see if he was hurt or what kind of an accident he might have gotten into.

Did you find any passengers in that vehicle? 1 Q 2. Α There was no one inside of it. 3 MS. LONGORIA: May I approach the exhibits, 4 Your Honor? 5 THE COURT: Yes, ma'am. 6 0 (By Ms. Longoria) I will show you what's already 7 been admitted into evidence as Petitioner's Exhibit 126, 8 127, 128, 129, and 130, if you can review those 9 photographs (complies). 10 Do those photographs fairly and accurately represent the vehicle that you found in 11 12 the ditch that morning? Yes, it does. 13 14 And can you describe to the jury the roadway O 15 that curves at that angle? What's on either side of the 16 roadway? Well, on the -- the way it appeared, they were 17 18 coming eastbound on the road, attempting to make a northbound. So, on the left side is the open ground for 19 20 the airport, on the ride side is a ditch and a fence that 21 follows around with the curve going northbound. 22 Is that a chain-link fence at that location? 0 That is a chain-link fence. 23 Α 24 Was that vehicle that appears in Petitioner's 25 126 in the ditch almost touching the chain-link fence?

Yes, it was. Yes, it is. Α 1 And when you found there were no passengers in 2 O 3 that vehicle, what did you do next? When I didn't see anybody around, I tried this 4 Α 5 one door to see if it was any kind of blood or anything 6 like that inside the vehicle in case somebody had actually 7 caused an accident and were injured, of course, and tried 8 to walk away to try to get help having no access to a cell 9 phone. 10 And what did you find? I found there was no blood signs of any kind. 11 Α So, I went back to my vehicle. 12 13 And what did you do next? 14 I went ahead and checked the license plate of the Α 15 vehicle. 16 And when you checked the license plate to the vehicle, what did you find? 17 The check on the vehicle returned -- showed that 18 Α it, the vehicle, had been stolen on an ag robbery. 19 20 Now, when you see that kind of display, you find a vehicle that's been stolen, can you tell what agency had 21 22 reported that vehicle stolen? 23 It was reported by the sheriff's office. Α 24 The Sheriff's Department office. They had reported the

vehicle stolen.

And what happened next? 1 Well, in such situation, is the first thing we do 2. is another agency, we hold the scene and contact the 3 immediate supervisor who is in direct investigation with 4 the robbery that is taking place and the stolen vehicle 5 6 which had been reported. 7 So, normally, in the course of things, when a 8 patrol officer responds to an aggravated robbery, it's 9 assigned to a detective to follow up; is that accurate? 10 That's accurate. Α And in this case, was there a detective that was 11 contacted to investigate the aggravated robbery? 12 I'm sure it was, but it wasn't by me. 13 14 Did a Harris County Sheriff's Deputy respond to O 15 your location? 16 Yes, they did. And was the vehicle recovered and towed from the 17 18 scene? Yes, they did. Yes, it was. 19 Α 20 Did you have the occasion to open the vehicle 21 and look at any of the contents? 22 When I opened the door to see if I could Α see any blood or anything, signs of somebody being hurt, I 23 notice the vehicle had clothes everywhere, old food, empty 24

bottles -- water bottles that is.
