 - Q. The only determination that you have that Ms. Cooper had was her word, correct?
- 11 A. Correct.

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- Q. And you chose to believe her, even though it very easily, looking at those circumstances, could have been someone burglarizing that apartment.
- A. I guess that it is possible but I've never had a burglar call me and try to report anything, so.
- Q. Aside from that fact, though, you have her picking up items, bundling them up, and moving out.
 - A. Correct.
- Q. You would clearly agree with me that a burglar could not give you consent to search someone else's apartment?
- 23 A. I would agree with you on that.
- Q. And if someone were to give consent, that person would have to have the authority to do so.

1 A. Correct.

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- Q. You mentioned that she was loading up articles of clothing. What specifically did you see?
- A. That I recall, she had, like, trash bag of clothes that she was gathering together and setting in the living room.
- Q. Do you have any idea of whether or not she was exclusively taking her own items?
 - A. No.
- Q. If she was taking items that did not belong to her, that would certainly be a crime, correct?
 - A. No.
 - Q. That would not be a crime for her to take items that didn't belong to her without permission?
 - A. If she had standing there in the apartment, it kind of becomes a civil matter, who owns what. I mean, I have no -- I have no reason to doubt -- I have no one complaining if -- does that make sense to you? Yeah.
