# Francis DeVita - January 25, 2012 Recross-Examination by The Defendant

THE DEFENDANT: Yes, ma'am. 1 Thank 2 you. (Jury enters the courtroom) 3 THE COURT: Thank you. Please have a 4 5 seat. And jurors, thank you for your patience. I'm 6 sorry I had to work on several other cases over the 7 lunch hour and they took much longer than we 8 anticipated. So, thank you for your patience. This officer has been called to the witness stand. Would 9 you raise your right hand, please. Look at the jury 10 11 so they can see you. 12 (Witness Duly Sworn) THE COURT: Thank you, sir. You may 13 14 have a seat right here. Thank you. You may begin. 15 MR. DRIVER: Thank you, Your Honor. 16 JUSTIN WARE, 17 having been first duly sworn, testified as follows: DIRECT EXAMINATION 18 19 0. (BY MR. DRIVER) Please introduce yourself 20 to the jury and spell your name for the court 2.1 reporter. 22 A . Officer Justin Ware, J-U-S-T-I-N, W-A-R-E. 23 Q. Officer Ware, how are you presently 24 employed? 25 Α. Houston Police Department special crimes

division family violence unit.

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- Q. And how long have you been employed with the Houston Police Department in total?
  - A. About five years.
  - Q. And how did you become a police officer?
- A. Went to the police academy and got certified as a peace officer with HPD, and pretty much went through a six-month probation period and patrol, and I passed it and became an officer.
- Q. Now, have you had any other educational background?
  - A. Yes, I have a master's in criminal justice.
- Q. Where is that from?
  - A. University of Houston downtown.
  - Q. Do you have an undergraduate degree?
- 16 A. Yes. Undergraduate in computer information 17 systems from the University of Phoenix.
- 18 **Q.** When did you finish your master's degree at the University of Houston?
  - A. This past December.
  - Q. Tell me a little bit about your duties as a police officer now. What do you do?
- A. Right now I'm assigned to family violence,
  and I investigate family violence incidents with
  patrol officers. I make reports, the reports get

sent to my office, and my supervisor assigns me a report as a case to work. And I do follow-up investigation, gather up evidence, interview complainants, interview suspects, and I get subpoenas, execute warrants. Just anything I need to do to complete my case.

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- Q. Do you focus on any particular area of town or all over?
- A. Right now I focus on just the majority the west part of town.
- Q. Do you recall where you were assigned back in June of 2010?
- A. I was assigned to the investigative first responder division. It's a uniformed investigative division on the east side of town.
- Q. All right. Describe this investigative first responder a little bit more to the jury.
- A. The investigator first responder is a division where we're in uniform, we drive regular patrol cars, not in plain clothes, and we answer calls for service. When somebody dialed 911, we show up, but when we show up, we do the initial report, and we do the ongoing investigation. So, we don't just show up and write a report and send it up for investigation, we do it ourselves.

- Q. So, whereas another case, normal case, might have some patrol officers respond and then a detective is later assigned to do some follow-up, you take it from the ground up?
- A. Yes. I do the original report, and I move on from there and do everything that needs to be done for the investigation as opposed to just doing the report and transmitting it and going to the next call like a regular officer does.
- Q. So, kind of having a patrol officer and detective rolled up into one job?
  - A. Yes.

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- Q. How long did you do that for?
- A. A little over two years.
- 15 **Q.** What other divisions have you been assigned to while in HPD?
  - A. I started in patrol, and then I got promoted to the investigative first responder division, and then I recently got promoted to family violence.
- 21 Q. I want to draw your attention specifically 22 to June 30, 2010. Were you on duty that day?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. Do you recall being called out to investigate a burglary or a robbery over on the east

side of town that day?

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- A. Yes, I was.
- $oldsymbol{\mathcal{Q}}.$  Tell me where you were when the call came in and where you responded to, and that sequence of events.
- A. Well, at that time, I was -- would have been somewhere in my district, which is called 11 District. I don't know exactly where I was when the call came in, but we got the call over the radio. It was a code 1 call of a robbery in progress, which means that we have to get there as soon as possible by using lights and sirens. So, when I got the call, I volunteered for it on the radio, and then I headed that way, you know, as fast as I safely could.
- Q. And do you recall where you ultimately ended up finding the scene?
- A. I arrived on the scene at the residence where the scene occurred, because over the radio, the other officers that were assisting had already caught the suspect. He was not at the location. He had ran from the location, so they caught him.
- Q. Okay. So, the original call sent you to one particular place, but then you hear that they have caught the guy and took him back to the original scene?

- 1 A. Yes.
  - Q. And is that where you went?
- A. Yes.

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- Q. And what kind of a scene was that?
- 5 A. It was a residence where the -- it had appeared that the house had been broken into.
  - Q. And that's a burglary?
  - A. And a burglary in criminal justice parlance, right?
  - Q. What did you do when you first showed up at the scene?
    - A. When I got to the scene, the patrol officers had the suspect in custody and they were bringing him back to the scene, so I went to speak with the complainant and the witnesses.
    - Q. And did you interview every -- all the witnesses and the complainant?
- A. I -- I believe -- I believe so. I

  interviewed the neighbor, I interviewed the

  complainant who owned the residence, and I

  interviewed the complainant who chased the suspect on

  his bike.
- 23 Q. And did you -- do you speak Spanish?
- 24 A. No.
- 25 Q. Did you have some assistance, someone who

does? 1 2 Yes. One of our supervisors, he spoke A . 3 fluent Spanish, and he assisted me in interviewing the witnesses. 4 And based on that conversation and their 5 0. 6 interviews, did you feel like you had a pretty good 7 understanding of what had happened? 8 Α. Yes. 9 Q. Did you go into the residence? 10 A . Yes. 11 MR. DRIVER: May I approach the 12 witness, Judge? THE COURT: Granted. 1.3 (BY MR. DRIVER) When you arrived on the 14 0. 15 scene, this is State's Exhibit No. 2, does this look 16 familiar to you? 17 Α. Yes. 18 Q. Is that the residence that we are -- you were describing earlier? 19 20 Α. Yes. 21 And when you first arrived, did you notice Q. 22 something about the windows? 23 The window was damaged and opened. Α. 24 Q. And what kind of damage was done?

Part of the window was -- glass was

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- Q. Let me show you State's Exhibit 3. Based on the type of damage you saw, is that consistent with a break-in or a burglary?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. And did you go on into the residence at that point?
    - A. Yeah, I inspected the inside also.
  - Q. Let me show you State's Exhibit 11. What are we looking at here?
- A. That's a door to one of the bedrooms inside of the residence, and there is there is a padlock that had been screwed into the door and into the door frame to secure it.
  - Q. And that's about in the middle of the photo here where I'm pointing, is that about right?
- 17 A. Yes.
  - **Q.** And what was the condition of that padlock?
    - A. It was -- it was damaged.
- 20 **Q.** What kind of damage was there?
- 21 A. The screws that held it to the plane was
  22 broken, as if somebody had broke the door in and
  23 riped the screws out the wall.
- Q. And again, is that consistent in your experience with a burglary or a break in?

1 A. Yes.

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- Q. Let's look at State's Exhibit 12. Do you recognize the contents of State's Exhibit 12?
  - A. Yes.
    - Q. And what are we looking at here?
  - A. That's a TV that's sitting in an entertainment center that is obvious that it has been moved. And looks like somebody was moving it, and then they just stopped for some reason.
- Q. As though they might have been interrupted, perhaps?
- 12 A. Yes.
- Q. And let me show you State's Exhibit 18. Is this the individual, a picture of the individual who was detained in the back of the patrolman's car when you arrived at the scene?
- 17 A. Yes.
  - Q. And do you see that individual here in the courtroom today?
- 20 A. Yes.
  - Q. Can you point him out for the jury and describe an article of his clothing?
- A. The gentleman wearing the blue and white striped shirt.
- 25 MR. DRIVER: May the record reflect

the witness has identified the defendant? 1 2 THE COURT: Yes, sir. (Defendant Identified) 3 (BY MR. DRIVER) Did you give the defendant 4 Q. 5 an opportunity to give his side of the story? 6 Α. Yes. 7 During that conversation or whatever took Q. 8 place --9 THE COURT: Approach just a moment, 10 please. 11 (At the Bench) 12 THE COURT: Are you talking about a 13 conversation in custody? 14 MR. - Q. (BY MR. DRIVER) Were there any other people at the residence where you were investigating?
- A. Yes. There was the complainant who owned the residence, there was the complainant who chased the suspect on the bike, and there was a number of other police officers, my supervisor, patrol supervisor, one of my partners, and patrol officers came by just, a lot of officers go by to help on high priority calls.
- Q. And once you had taken a look at the scene and once you had had a chance to interview all the witnesses, did you take a look at the property that was recovered from the person of the defendant and in the backpack that was recovered?
  - A. Yes.

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- Q. Let me show you State's Exhibit 4. Is that one of the items of property?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. And 5, I guess, is the back side of that same item. Were you able to determine who that property belongs to?
- A. Yes.
- Q. How -- who -- whose property was it?
- 25 A. It was the complainant who owned the

1 residence.

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- Q. And is his name Henry Sanchez?
- A. I don't remember exactly which complainant was which. If I could check my report to make sure.
  - Q. Absolutely.
  - A. Yes, it was.
  - Q. And did Mr. Sanchez show you anything that helped lend credence to what he was telling you was his property?
  - A. Yes. He still had the packages that some of the items came in.
    - Q. So, did you match up some of these electronics with boxes that he still had for the same items?
- 15 A. Yes.
  - Q. And based on that and his identification, did you give him back his property or did you tag it into evidence? What happened?
- 19 A. I gave it back -- the property to him.
- Because, I mean, it was his, and we had recovered it.
- 21 Q. And looking at State's Exhibit 6 and 7, 22 this is another item that was recovered, correct?
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. And how about items 8, and 9, is that just another item?

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- Q. And then, there is State's Exhibit 10, also some items that he was able to show you that he either had they belonged to some of the property that was recovered or maybe to the television or he had boxes for it or something?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. And you released the property back to its rightful owner?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. Once you had done that, and you had interviewed the witness, what was your next step?
- A. After I interviewed the witnesses, and that's when I gave the suspect an opportunity to tell his side and asked, you know, what happened.
- Q. Okay. And without -- let's not go into anything he may have said. After that happened, what decisions, if any, did you make with regard to the defendant? Did -- in other words, was he under arrest at that point?
- A. Yes, we detained him until we, you know, called the district attorney's office, and presented all the evidence we had, and they approved charges.
- Q. And ultimately, he was charged with an offense. And where did he go at that point? Did you

take him, did he go with a patrol officer? 1 2 A . He was in the back of my police car at that point, and a different officer was going to drive him 3 downtown to jail while I completed the charges and 4 5 the report. So, we took him from my car to my -- one 6 of my partner's cars. 7 Oh. From the time that you arrived on the Q. 8 scene, was the defendant continuously in the custody 9 of the Houston Police Department? 10 Α. Yes. And is that area where all this took place 11 0. 12 in Harris County, Texas? 1.3 A . Yes. 14 MR. DRIVER: Pass the witness, Judge. 15 THE COURT: Thank you. 16 Cross-examination, Mr. Morris? 17 CROSS-EXAMINATION (BY THE DEFENDANT) What is your name, sir? 18 Q. 19 Α. Justin Ware. 20 Q. Justin Ware. Detective? 2.1 Just officer. A . 22 Q. Officer Ware. Officer Ware, at your job, or whatever department you work under? 23 24 Α. Yes, HPD, Houston Police Department.

When y'all get these kind of robberies,

burglaries and all this other, do y'all not come with equipment and get fingerprints and whatever else?

- A. There is no concrete rule of what we do with every scene. It's like every -- every scene is dynamic. So, just because one case needs a certain thing, it does not mean a different case needs a certain thing. So, we just go scene by scene and see what we need.
- Q. Did y'all not do nothing in there -- did y'all not try to take any action as far as finding evidence on maybe -- in any kind of way?
- A. Well, the evidence that we recovered was all inside of the backpack that was recovered when you were running from the complainant.
- Q. I mean, that doesn't mean, though, that it could have happened that very moment, right?
  - A. Well, the complainant told me that he --
  - Q. Oh, he --
    - A. He saw you. He said he saw you.
- **Q.** Okay.

- A. And he chased you. Him and his buddy chased you and he -- one of the remote controls, he snatched it away from you while you were running.
- Q. One of the guys that says that -- he say he chased me and seen me, he couldn't even identify me

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right now. He didn't identify me.
